Ohio interchangeably describes drunk driving laws as DUI's or DWI's until 1983 when the law was amended to refer to these crimes as OMVI's



WHAT DOES IT STAND FOR?

DUI: Driving under influence DWI: Driving while impaired

1983-2004

OMVI

OMVI was used in Ohio to describe a person caught driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol. It was changed again in 2004 to OVI.



WHAT DOES IT STAND FOR?

OMVI: Operating Motor Vehicle Impaired

2004-PRESENT

OVI

OVI is the term currently used by the Ohio legislature to describe a charge of driving a car while under the influence of drugs or alcohol.



WHAT DOES IT STAND FOR?

OVI: Operating Vehicle Impaired.



Different states have different terms used to describe drunk driving but they all boil down to the same message; no matter your location, you should

NEVER DRIVE UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF DRUGS OR ALCOHOL.
